	Listening and Appraising various musical artists and genres
Start points	Finding our voice and learning to sing by ourselves and as a group
	In Key Stage One children learn to play tuned and un-tuned percussion to help developed understanding elements of music and
	basic musical notation.
	In Key Stage Two children expand on previous learning by learning the recorder, ukulele and boom whackers.
Pupil- led learning	Children work in groups to create compositions, performances and give feedback on a variety of musical experiences. Pupil's given opportunities to watch their own recorded performances and give feedback.
	Various performances throughout the school year such as Christmas carol concerts, school masses and worships, Y3&4 Pascal Play, Y6 end of year play, summer musical evenings & recorded performances for social media outlets.
	Every child at the Marist has the opportunity to learn an instrument from a vast range of instruments from private peripatetic music teachers as well at the opportunity to join the various music clubs on offer at the Marist.
Visits and visitors	Visits and visitors planned to inspire and support learning.
	Demonstration days with local musicians and teachers to inspire children to learn a different instrument.
	Musical performances at Christmas from accomplished musicians
	Yearly visit to the O2 London to perform at Young Voices
Local area	Performances in local area: St John's Church, Oakcroft retirement home, links with Together for Music to connect with local retirement homes.



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Links to understanding wider society	Weekly focus on listening to music from a wide variety of genres, artists and linking them to historical and geographical contexts.
Discussion and debates	Opportunities provided to share own opinions on performances and bi-weekly listening. Development of evaluative and analytical language when discussing pieces.
